Dr. George Georgiou

Literacy

George Georgiou is a professor at the Department of Educational Psychology and director at the J.P. Das Centre on Developmental and Learning Disabilities at the Faculty of Education at the University of Alberta. His research interests include reading development across languages, remediation of reading difficulties, executive functioning and home literacy environment. He is on the editorial board for many journals, including the Alberta Journal of Educational Research. He has received numerous awards, including the Alberta Teachers' Association Educational Research Award. For his literacy work with children in Alberta schools, he has been named to the Royal Society of Canada. He holds a PhD in philosophy, a master's degree in education and a bachelor's degree in education.

Dr. Alain Desrochers

French Language Literacy

Alain Desrochers holds a PhD in Experimental Psychology from the University of Western Ontario. He was Full Professor at the University of Ottawa until his retirement in July 2017 and then Scientific Director of the Montreal Learning Disabilities Institute until January 2019. He is now Adjunct Professor at the University of Ottawa and the Université du Québec à Montréal, and still director of the Reading Development Research Group. His area of expertise combines psycholinguistics and literacy development. Dr. Desrochers is a

preeminent Francophone scholar in the field of early childhood literacy. He is the author or editor of 8 books, the author of 22 book chapters, and has produced over 300 academic papers. His research includes investigating the historical evolution of alphabetic languages, the development of reading skills among French- and English-speaking children, the development of reading-writing assessment tools, and the development of reading-writing instruction material for teachers.

Dr. Srilata Ravi

Srilata Ravi is a professor of French and Francophone Studies, Campus Saint-Jean, University of Alberta. She completed her doctorate in comparative literature at the University of Madras, India, in 1991 and held academic positions in Singapore and Australia before accepting a position at the Campus St-Jean in Edmonton where she now teaches and researches French and Francophone literature and culture.

She retired from the Faculty of Native Studies, University of Alberta, in 2012, and is now Professor Emerita.

Elizabeth (Betty) Letendre

Indigenous Perspectives

Elder Betty Letendre is a traditional Cree/Metis woman from the Papaschase Band and is a direct descendant of Papastewo. She grew up in the area north-east of Lac La Biche. Her parents, her first teachers, lived off the land in a traditional way. Elder Letendre is grounded in her Cree/ Métis culture and traditions. She is a Cree speaker and proudly mentors Cree language students. As a champion for children, Elder Letendre is active in her community; she is an advocate for a just and safe society where all children, families and community are accepted and nurtured. Elder Letendre has held management positions in various organizations including Teacher-Manager of Ben Calf Robe Adult Education and Head Start Programs. In her capacity as an Elder, she provides leadership to the Council of Elders and serves as Manager of Edmonton Catholic Schools: Council of Elders. She works tirelessly with many different community agencies striving to improve the lives of families, youth and children. Elder Letendre is also a mother, grandmother, and great grandmother.

Roy Henry Louis

Indigenous Perspectives

Elder Roy Louis is a member of the Samson Cree Nation. He is from a family of leadership and former

President of the Indian Association of Alberta from 1988 to 1990. Elder Louis is a co-founding member of Peace Hills Trust Company in 1980 and Peace Hills General Insurance in 1982. Elder Louis helped initiate the Pe Sakastew Healing Centre in Maskwacis with former Commissioner Ole Ingstrup. In 2005, he and his wife Judy traveled to China to receive an International Award for the Healing Centre. He is the recipient of Canada's 125 Medal in 1992 and the Alberta Centennial Medal in 2005 for his continued volunteerism, multiculturalism and promotion of cultural awareness and business development for First Nations. He is also the recipient of the Queens Diamond Jubilee medal in September of 2012 for his work with Police at K-Division as an Aboriginal Advisor from 2007 to 2015. Elder Louis was a member of the Senate for the University of Alberta and a member of the Capital Health Authority Board until 1998. Elder Louis is also a member of the RCMP Commissioner's National Indigenous Advisory Committee with another reappointment for five years. Elder Louis is an Indigenous Advisor to the Commissioner of Corrections in Ottawa, On December 3, 2013, Elder Louis received a Lifetime Achievement Award from Alberta Aboriginal Role Models. In July 2014, Elder Louis was chosen as one of Alberta's Most Influential People for his role as a Community Leader. Elder Louis and his wife Judy were finalists for the Alberta Emerald Award for their work in reviving the Water Ceremony in Maskwacis. Elder Louis is currently a board member for the Heroes and History Foundation for Alberta. He is also on the Battle River Lieutenant Governor of Alberta Arts Awards for 2017 hosted by Maskwacis. Elder Louis is a participating Elder for the "Indigenous Introductory Training" for all Alberta government employees.

Judy Louis

Indigenous Perspectives

Elder Judy Louis is a highly motivated, high-energy educational consultant with a demonstrated track record for fostering learning and promoting multicultural diversity. She is a recipient of an Excellence of Teaching Award and the Alberta



Centennial Medal for innovative approaches to education and the promotion of cultural diversity. Elder Louis is from a family of nine children: four biological siblings of Scandinavian descent and five adopted from varied multicultural backgrounds. Many years later, the family learned three of the children were part of the 60's Scoop. Many commented her family looked like the United Nations. Her mom early identified that the First Nations siblings needed to learn about their heritage and so Elder Louis' journey began along with them. During that time, she was traditionally adopted into a family from the Samson Cree Nation and over time she has learned the beauty and strength of the First Nations People by actively participating in many traditional ceremonies and the teachings of Plains Cree Spiritual Leaders. Elder Louis and her husband Roy were finalists at the 2016 Emerald Awards for promoting the sacredness of water in Central Alberta that had International impact. She is an avid collector of First Nations artifacts and loves to travel. As a trained investigator for Corrections Service Canada, Elder Louis can often be found working in federal correctional facilities. As well, Elder Louis is a former board member for 16 years on the Citizens Advisory Committee at Pe Sakastew Healing Centre in Maskwacis where the goal is to successfully reintegrate the offenders into the community. She recently retired from Alberta Human Services as a committee member for Social Care Facilities. She enjoys the 14 grandchildren from her blended family with her husband Roy.

Charles (Vincent) Yellow Old Woman

Indigenous Perspectives

Vincent Yellow Old Woman is a member of the Siksika Nation, which is the second-largest land area reserve in Canada. Siksika Nation is located approximately one hour East of Calgary with 7,500 plus members, with approximately 4,000 living on the reserve. They are part of the Blackfoot confederacy, which consists of Siksika, Piikani, Kainaiwa and the Blackfeet in the State of Montana. He is married 46 years to his beloved wife, Vicki, with whom he practises a healthy lifestyle. They

have two children, one deceased, nine grandchildren, and one great granddaughter who all call him Papa and consider him the best storyteller in the world. He graduated in 1975 from a small theological college in New York State. He has a certificate in Aboriginal Leadership, Governance and Management from the Banff Centre. He has served his people as a councillor from 1995, culminating in being their Chief from 2013 to 2016, after which he stepped aside to let the next generation take the reins. He is a well-respected elder and mentor in his community, having survived nine years of residential schooling, and overcome addictions to become a role model.
